Ways We Gather

Our in-person Sunday Services, RE programs, and congregational outreach thrived throughout the spring. Members and friends returned to our building on Sunday mornings, the choir performed, and during the pandemic the number of children we are serving has *increased*. These are very positive indicators. Let's work to sustain and build upon them.

We intend to continue multi-platform Sunday services as well. Even though at current risk levels our pandemic guidelines allow many to be in the building, the multi-platform option allows active participation by anyone with access to the Internet. Hopedale's way of doing this invites remote participants to make announcements, share joys and concerns, offer congregational feedback, and take part in a discussion after services. The Social Justice Committee also expects to offer multi-platform options for a special series this summer.

Facilities Improvements

I've reported on progress toward realizing Hopedale's facilities planning priorities in this *Newsletter*, and the priorities for physical improvements established by the congregation remain intact. With generous support of the congregation and a Chalice Lighter grant, our lower level has been rehabilitated for RE and is now being enjoyed.

Our property has long-term drainage issues. During recent construction, when we were in the building daily, we saw clear evidence that groundwater has been entering the building at the foundation. To address this maintenance problem properly the Construction Task Force and the Board reviewed professional recommendations and cost estimates by two companies specializing in water control. This summer we plan to address water entering the building, improve roof drainage, and install new drainage for the south lawn.

The approved approach is installing an interior drain at north, west and east perimeter walls of the building beneath the lower-level floor. This requires removing a section of the floor to install a drain, replacing the floor, and repairing any drywall affected during installation. The full scope of work also includes installing a drain outside the east wall; adding a downspout to the south gutter; installing a new field line to drain the south lawn; and directing all drains, downspouts, and field lines into an exit drain line east of the building that empties to the north beyond the driveway.

The Construction Task Force discussed this project in detail and recommended doing it as basic maintenance important to the long-term use and value of our property. At its May meeting the Board deliberated at length and voted unanimously to proceed this summer with

the project described here. Initial work is scheduled for *July 18 to 22*. Once the drainage system is installed, our contractor will repair any drywall or stairsteps needing attention.

The Hopedale Facilities Fund may partly defray this project's cost, but we will need to reserve in it the amounts needed to rehabilitate driveways, install accessible parking, and purchase room separators for the RE area. Operating budget, savings, and donor funds will be drawn upon to complete this work. The Finance Committee Chair supports the approach.

Members and friends of Hopedale have proven to be generous when helping meet our needs. New donations earmarked for this project will be gratefully received and put to good use right away. Let me know if you would like more information about what's ahead for us.

UUA General Assembly will convene in multi-platform format from Portland, Oregon between June 22 and 26. Liz Woedl and Libby Earle are Hopedale's voting delegates, and Genevieve O'Malley Knight will attend as Religious Educator. They will attend from Oxford via multi-platform registration. Transgender Inclusion in Congregations A six-session online course by the Transforming Hearts Collective

What to Expect

This is a six-session course designed for all skill levels to expand friends and members of Hopedale's knowledge of *trans* identity, and to build skills to help our congregation create a place that is fully inclusive and affirming of the entire breadth of gender diversity. Through deep introspection and discussion, we will examine how to counter the dominant narratives about who *trans* people are and widen the circle of welcome to become a radically welcoming community.

Why on Sundays

Throughout the Pandemic we have continued to support and care for one another virtually, binding us in right relationship and holding each other as we build Beloved Community. Fulfilling our commitment to Widening the Circle through responding to the Actions of Immediate Witness to <u>Defend and Advocate with Transgender, Nonbinary, and Intersex Communities</u> and <u>Undoing Systemic White Supremacy: A Call to Prophetic Action</u> is sacred work that we choose to ground as part of worship.

Why Now

As a Welcoming Congregation, it is important that our Beloved Community understand the increasingly violent forms of oppression that are threatening individuals who identify as transgender, and that everything we do on our Community's journey toward spiritual wholeness reflect Right Relations. One of the components of our Covenant for Right Relations is to "Consistently work to stand on the side of love and approach any potentially difficult situation with both respect for human dignity and actions for community safety."

Course Expectations

At your convenience prior to attending the Sunday meeting, you will view a video presentation [using the transcript option is recommended] of about 50 minutes, plus supplemental resources that are very informative. Questions and prompts for reflection are given. Following the worship portion on Sunday, we will discuss the material in person or via Zoom. You are encouraged to keep a journal of your reflections. The goal is to plan ways we can take action to be *radically welcoming*.

How to Participate

Registration materials will be sent to Hopedale members and friends via email (or mail). Registration will enable sharing the link to materials weekly, and other weekly communications.

This week: Solarize Oxford is holding a meeting with Matt Kolbinsky of Prolighting Solar and a representative of Duke on Thursday, June 2 at 5 p.m. in the Havighurst room at the library. It is for people who already have solar, and for people interested in solar to see how much money they can save.

The Hopedale vegetable garden is starting to produce results and yummy things may be available if you are interested. Since we will not be in the building regularly, text Peggy (937-733-7327) or Mary (513-284-8105) if you want to be notified of availability. Right now, we have "green garlic," rhubarb and lettuce. We have planted beans, tomatoes, sweet and hot peppers, zucchini, okra, and cucumbers for later. Garlic scapes will come soon.

Butler County Commissioners have notified residents of their intent to bar large-scale wind and solar development from most of Butler County (outside of incorporated areas). Senate Bill 52, which recently went into effect, allows counties to do this. A public hearing will be held June 13, 2022, 9:30 AM at the Government Administration Center 315 High Street, Hamilton. A group from Oxford is planning to attend and testify.

Redistricting is still pending. The Redistricting Commission declined to meet for 20 days, despite efforts by the minority members. The day before the 5th set of maps was due they finally held a meeting. The Senate president and the Speaker of the House designated other politicians to take their places and left the meeting. Then the commission declined to rehire the independent mapmakers to finish their mostly-completed maps, declined another map proposed by the minority members, and adopted the exact same map (Map#3 – now also Map#5) previously thrown out by the Ohio Supreme Court. It appears we will hold the August General Assembly Primary using unconstitutional maps just as we used unconstitutional maps for the Congressional Primary in May. Contempt of court charges are still pending.

Since the Chief Justice of the Ohio Supreme Court will retire in December that election in November may determine what happens to the idea of ending gerrymandering going forward. Since the Governor, Auditor and Secretary of State are automatically Commission Members, those elections also take on increased significance!
