Last year nearly 3,000 Butler County children were identified as victims of abuse or neglect. Volunteers spend time with these children, talk to adults in their lives, and go to court hearings to provide information and insight about the children’s future placements. 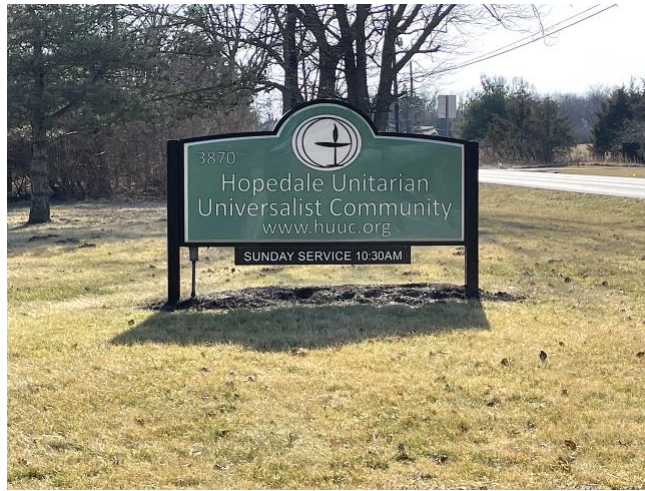

Responding to concerns expressed in recent congregational discussions, the Board has begun identifying relatively modest physical changes we can make to improve Hopedale's functionality and character. Here is one of them:

On Sunday, February 18 I placed a rock in our pond in honor of the long service, faithfulness, and generosity of three of our founding members who have recently passed and left bequests or estate gifts to Hopedale.

I read from a letter we received from Ted Loucks on behalf of himself and his siblings, Eric and Kimberly. They have committed make to a substantial gift to Hopedale from their mother's estate in honor of their parents, Orie and Elinor Loucks, "with the intent that it be used for improvements planned to the current church building and grounds." Elinor attended Hopedale *via* Zoom while living in Wisconsin, and her children had been with her during our congregational discussion of plans for facilities improvements. "We believe," they said, "that such use is consistent with my parents' wishes to support the continued growth of a vibrant community." While hoping to support ongoing Hopedale initiatives they feel would appeal to their parents, their gift will be made with no specific restrictions.

"As you know," Ted wrote, "my parents were founding members of the church in 1990, contributing untold hours of their time along with their talents and treasure over twenty-five years as part of the community. Their dedication to Unitarian Universalist congregations and causes wherever they lived set an example for us, their children, that has carried through to our own work in our own home churches. You may be aware that in addition to Hopedale, my parents were founding members of UU churches in Fredericton, New Brunswick in the 1950s and in Madison, Wisconsin in the late 1960s."

"We recognize that we are fortunate as a family to be in a position to make such a gift, and that our fortune is a result of privilege combined with the hard work and sacrifice of both our parents over their lifetimes. Please accept this gift in the spirit it is intended, to help further the mission of Hopedale Unitarian Universalist Community, especially promoting 'human worth and dignity in continuity with the Earth and the Universe.'"

Bylaws Revision

At a special Congregational Meeting held Sunday, February 11, Linda Amspaugh, Leadership and Nominating Committee Chair, proposed a revision to Hopedale *Bylaws* that divided the Vice President for Stewardship position into a Vice President for Stewardship and a Vice President for Facilities. This proposal was endorsed by the Board. Wording changes to the *Bylaws* that enable it were unanimously adopted on the 11th and will go into effect with the election of new officers at our Spring Congregational Meeting.
