Gardening news

The garden is getting a good start in spite of the recent goofy weather! We are expanding the space from last summer by adding ground-level beds along the east and south fence. The grass and weeds have been killed but the area still needs to be dug up and raked smooth. Peggy could use help with that ASAP. Then we can plant cucumbers, pole beans, and okra!

The garden can also use weekly help over the summer like last year. Can you volunteer a week to help with watering and picking? It only takes a couple of hours. You don't need any special skills or knowledge! Just a couple of hours you can spare.

So far we have planted tomatoes (3 kinds), peppers (2 kinds), yellow summer squash, zucchini, beets, turnips, radishes, parsley, basil, lettuce (several kinds), kale, broccoli, garlic, oregano, rhubarb, thyme, rosemary, sage, spinach, green beans. We are trying to get a couple of corners ready for hubbard and butternut winter squash.
